### **Report of Fiscal Year 2015 Activities and Fiscal Year 2016 Plan**

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to individuals, corporations, and organizations for extending valuable and warm support to PHJ during the fiscal year (FY) 2015 ended on June 30, 2015. Please take a look of the PHJ's activities in FY2015 and the FY2016 plan in the following.

### **FY2015** Activities Report

PHJ continued the maternal and child health improvement education programs in the five countries of South East Asia and the East Japan disaster reconstruction support in Japan.

In Indonesia and Cambodia, new country directors successfully led the programs, while in Thailand and Vietnam, the programs were implemented steadily. In Myanmar, PHJ concluded a Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Health and commenced preparation for organization registration and practical programs. The donation for these programs amounted 95.11 million yen, short of 5.66 million yen against the revenue budget of 100.77 million yen (including public fund and excluding goods). The expenditure was 10.253 million yen, 0.29 million yen exceeding the budget of 102.24million yen.

The donation of goods including wall-clocks, calculators to Indonesia and Cambodia and nutrition function food for Cambodia amounted 1.12 million yen.

Many individual and corporate donors support the PHJ's East Japan disaster reconstruction efforts. The revenue including the amount brought forward from FY2014 reached 15.66 million yen, while the expenditure was 12.46 million yen. The balance of 3.2million yen will be brought forward.

### 1. Indonesia Program (Total amount: 15.74 million yen)

The FY2015 is the final year of the regional healthcare system improvement program at Tirthayasa Autonomous District, Serang District, Banteng Province. PHJ implemented the programs in 14 villages based on the seven (7) Poskesdes (health clinic with child birth facilities) constructed under the PHJ program. This program aiming at safe delivery and child birth and healthy growth of infants has been well established in the villages. The nutrition education support such as the vegetable garden education, menu book publication and distribution, nutrition volunteer training, and home vegetable garden training



were implemented. The training of midwives contributed in increasing their confidence in providing monthly education to villagers effectively as shown on the right photo.

As a result of these support programs, the child birth rate attended by midwives has been 95% continuously. PHJ confirmed that the emergency transportation to clinics, hospitals has been well coordinated between the villagers and health clinics according to the investigation to village heads and midwives.

In FY2016, after the transfer of the PHJ programs to the autonomous district, PHJ will start another program at another autonomous district in the Serang District.

### 2. Cambodia Program (Total amount: 18.94 million yen)



The three year project of community based health care improvement in Kompong Thom was completed in July 2014 achieving the initial targets. Specifically speaking, training of community care workers for mothers and newborns, improvement of water and sanitary conditions such as supporting model households with construction of toilets, support of villagers and health centers for networking, and introduction of emergency transport system with tuktuks were successfully completed and these functions were transferred to the villages and health centers. As a result, the number of pregnant women taking periodical health check increased four (4) times and the child delivery at the

health center increased 143 times in 2014 comparing with 2007 before the introduction of PHJ program. It is clear that the PHJ program influenced the villagers' health behaviors positively as they are voluntarily taking these health checks.

Since October 2014, PHJ has been implementing a three year regional health system improvement for mothers and children program in Kompong Cham Province. PHJ will focus on strengthening health administration network, training of midwives, strengthening health center function, improving villagers' awareness in order to extend appropriate health care services to pregnant women and infants. During the first year, PHJ extended facilitation training to the health administration staffs so that they will give appropriate leadership and supervision of health centers. Also PHJ organized post-graduation training of junior midwives, extended equipment and office supplies to health centers, and trained health volunteers who will undertake health education to villagers as shown on the above photo.

### 3. Thai and Vietnam Program (Total Amount 35.34 million yen)

Having implemented the youth HIV/AIDS prevention education for over 10 years in Chiang Mai Province, PHJ started a three year program in 2014 targeting the 18 vocational college (VC) students. In FY2015 120 peer educators were trained in six VCs, extending peer education to 1,950 students. Also PHJ supported installation of a peer education room (called Youth Corner as shown on the right photo) in the six VCs and HIV antibody checks to 166 students.

The HOPE partner program supporting disabled children has been implemented since 1998. In FY2015 two patients who do not have Thai citizenship left the program and one patient passed away after suffering from illness for several years. Presently PHJ is extending periodical rehabilitation classes, home visits by therapists toward 21 patients.



Under the pediatric cardiovascular operation support program funded by generous donors, 28 patients received operation. PHJ also supported 38 patients with heart diseases in remote villages to receive medical examination from Chiang Mai University Hospital doctors through a mobile clinic.

In Vietnam, PHJ is implementing a three year breast cancer awareness education program in cooperation with Vietnam Women's Union using the experiences and knowhow of cervical cancer prevention education program in Thailand. In the second year, 6,113 women exceeding the target of 5,000 women practiced the breast self examination. Sixteen (16) women found lumps and after

further examination, six (6) women were diagnosed breast cancer and they are receiving treatments. In the third year, the program will be implemented in another region.

### 4. Myanmar Program (Total Amount 10.94 million yen)



In August 2014, PHJ concluded a Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Health and established the Myanmar office in Naypidaw in March 2015. Under the request of the government, PHJ will implement the maternal and child health care improvement program in the Tackton Township and started preparations of registration and program implementation.

PHJ also donated thermometers and blood pressure sensors to the Ministry of Health in July. According to the change of local request,

PHJ will not undertake the planned renovation of the Station Hospital but construct sub-centers and investigated the budget and construction vendors.

In July, PHJ also delivered an ambulance originally donated to a fire brigade in Kumamoto from a Japanese donor to the Tackton Township Hospital and the donation ceremony was held in Naypidaw as shown on the photo above.

### 5. East Japan Disaster Reconstruction Support Program (Total amount 12.46 million yen)

In Kesen-numa, PHJ donated medical equipment to the hospitals requiring such support through the Kesen-numa Medical Association. In Ishinomaki, PHJ donated a minicar and rehabilitation equipment to the Comprehensive Care Center of the Ishinomaki City Kaisei Temporary Clinic. In Tagajo, PHJ donated maintenance parts for the dialysis equipment.

### 6. Number of Supporting Members

As of the end of FY2015, 1,170 individual supporting members, 400 other individual donors, 160 corporate supporting members, and 200 other corporations are supporting the PHJ programs. Thanks to their support, PHJ is able to implement the above-mentioned international programs.

### FY2016 Business Plan

In the international projects, PHJ will focus on the maternal and child health care improvement in FY2016.

### Indonesia Program (Total amount: 12 million yen)

PHJ will implement only sanitary education in the Thirtayasa autonomous district and start the maternal and child health improvement program in the Warinkurun autonomous district with the accumulated knowledge and experience in Thirtayasa over past 10 years. In FY2016, PHJ will concentrate on fact finding and communication building in the new district.

### Cambodia Program (Total amount: 22 million yen)

In the second year of the maternal and child health improvement program in Kampong Cham, PHJ will support the health administration staff trained during the first year to undertake monitoring of health center operations. Also PHJ will provide more training of junior midwives and monitor their performance at the health center in assisting child delivery. Training of health volunteers who will conduct health education to villagers and training of community care workers who will visit and support expecting mothers are planned in FY2016.

### Thailand and Vietnam Program (Total amount: 32.49 million yen)

PHJ will implement the final year program of HIV/AIDS prevention education, extend support to 21 children under the HOPE partner program, extend pediatric cardiovascular support to non-Thai patients and conduct education and promotion activities using pamphlets and booklets. In Vietnam as the breast cancer prevention education program will be completed during the fiscal year, PHJ will implement the breast self examination by 5,000 women and the transfer of the program to the Vietnam Women's Union.

Myanmar (Total amount: 24.33 million yen) As the first step of the maternal and child health improvement, PHJ will undertake investigation as well as training of midwives, building midwives network and health center network, and health education. PHJ will also construct two sub-centers.

## **East Japan Disaster Reconstruction Support (Total amount: 7.2 million yen)** PHJ will continue reconstruction support in Kesen-numa, Ishinomaki, and Tagajo.

### Indonesia FY2015 Program Report

During FY2015, PHJ continued to implement the regional health care system improvement program, that has been carried out since 2004, in 14 villages including the Tunda Island in Thirtayasa autonomous district. The target population is 37,000 persons, including approximately 5,000 under five children, and approximately 9,000 possible mothers. This fiscal year being the final program year, PHJ focused on the transfer of the project knowhow and scheme to the district so that the health clinics continue to extend fine medical and health care services to the villagers. PHJ also conducted an investigation to find out achievements and evaluation of PHJ projects.

Our program to improve medical and health services to mothers for safe delivery consists of following three projects:

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- 1. maternal and child health improvement,
- 2. regional health care system improvement, and



nutrition education.

Regarding the maternal and child health improvement, PHJ extends medical check of pregnant women and monthly health education by midwife, periodical meeting of midwives and traditional birth attendants. Each midwife stationed in a village prepares a monthly education plan focusing on topics useful to pregnant women to transfer the information and knowledge necessary for safe delivery and healthy

growth of infants. The midwives have developed good relationship with mothers and pregnant women and are trusted by villagers as shown on the above photo. Thanks to their efforts, delivery rate by traditional birth attendants decreased to less than 1% and delivery rate attended by midwives increased to 97,7%. At emergency, the midwives provide necessary referral method. Since 2004 PHJ constructed total seven (7) poskesdes (clinic with delivery facilities) and the delivery at clinics increased from 0 to 89.9%, while birth at home decreased to less than 10%. Compared with the villages without the maternal and child health improvement program, PHJ program sites show far better inicators as shown on the following table.

Also PHJ implemented nutrition improvement program to improve the rate of malnutrition children that was a serious issue before PHJ started the program. PHJ introduced vegetable gardening and nutrition education. PHJ targeted to cultivate one vegetable garden for one village and the harvested vegetables were distributed to pregnant women and mothers with infants as shown on the right photo. A village midwife and health volunteers are taking





initiatives in this program and from now on 10 villages among 13 villages decided to support the gardening and further promote home vegetable gardening. More than 300 villagers participated in gardening classes and 95% of the participants decided to cultivate home vegetable garden.

Further PHJ provided nutrition education including facilitation training to health volunteers who would transfer nutrition knowledge to villagers assisting

midwives. According to their report, after the training, 80% of the mothers tried cooking at home using the recipe cards. The left photo shows the health volunteers holding recipe cards.

In FY2016, PHJ will renew the Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Health and start the maternal and child health improvement at Waringkurun autonomous district that has high rate of delivery with tranditional birth attendants.

### Cambodia – FY2015 Report and FY2016 Plan

### ■FY2015 Report

In September 2014, PHJ Cambodia relocated its office from Kampong Thom (KT), where PHJ implemented the maternal and child health improvement project for 10 years, to Kampong Cham (KC). Since October, we have been engaged in the three year primary health care system strengthening project in KC based on our experiences in KT. However, the KC project is different from the KT project on its scope. The main difference is the involvement of the Operational District (OD) administration in the project management, meeting arrangement, data collection, and so on in addition to the health centers that the OD is supervising. The purpose of this OD involvement is to strengthen the OD's health administration capability to continue the KC project activities by themselves even after the completion of the KC project.



This project consists of four components.

- 1. Capacity building of OD
- 2. Training of health staffs mainly midwives
  - Strengthening health centers
  - administration
  - Improving villagers' health awareness

As for the training for health staffs, PHJ organized midwives lecture for three days toward 114 junior midwives belonging to the health centers in the

OD. During the training, not only providing lectures, but also proving practical lessons using baby dolls proved very effective as shown on the above photo. The participants were very eager to widen their knowledge and improve their skills. Except one absentee on the first day, all participants fully attended the training. We found their willingness to learn from the pre-training and post-training tests. The average score increased almost double from 43% to 84%.

PHJ also organized health education in villages to improve health awareness of the villagers. Health volunteers of each village took initiatives in providing health education assisted by a PHJ staff. The

average number of participants in the village health education was 52 including 27 or 28 adults over 15 years old. During the health education we conducted quiz questions on health knowledge so that the participants can learn and enjoy the program at the same time. The villagers who passed the quiz received a tooth paste and brush set and soap each for example. In addition, PHJ distributed SOYJOY, nutrition food, donated by Otsuka Pharmaceutical Co., Ltd. to all participants and they all appreciated. The right photo shows a health volunteer providing health education to the Moslem villagers.



### ■FY2016 Plan

During the first year of the KC project, PHJ worked for foundation building such as communication and networking with concerned organizations and persons as well as providing training. In FY2016, the second year, PHJ will focus on developing the programs on the foundation built in the first year. Our main focus will be on the capacity building of OD so that the local people continue the KC project by themselves even after the completion of the PHJ project. ### Thailand – FY2015 Highlight

Yokogawa (Thailand) Ltd. has been a strong supporter of PHJ-Thailand for many years. As the company celebrates the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2015, PHJ organized two outreach programs with the donation fund from the company.



In one program, PHJ participated in the event to support the children with disabilities and chronic diseases organized by Kawila Anukul School for children with developmental disabilities and learning difficulties. The purpose of the event was to guide the children in their future study and employment. At the PHJ booth, we distributed brochures on the HOPE partner program and organized coloring/drawing and health game sessions to introduce our activities as

shown on the left photo. More than 150 children and participants came to the PHJ booth . They had much fun with the activities we provided.

Another outreach program supported by Yokogawa (Thailand) Ltd. was the HIV/AIDS prevention education. PHJ has been implementing a three year program targeting technical college students in

Chiang Mai province. PHJ organized three education sessions, including one in Hang Dong district for local residents, and Mae Rim and Muang districts for junior high school students. PHJ organized the latter two programs based on the education for technical college students. For example, the students prepared human body drawings in actual size to understand each one's body characteristics as shown on the right photo. They also learned the correct use of condoms, route of HIV infection visually through water



exchange game, and so on. Altogether 185 students participated in the programs eager to learn.

### <mark>Myanmar – Starting Sub-Center Construction and FY2016 Business Plan</mark> By Yuichi Shingai, Country Director, PHJ Myanmar

### Starting Construction of Sub-centers (Clinic with Delivery Facilities)

PHJ Myanmar Office has been working on the construction of sub-centers in T to kton Township.



The clinic with delivery facilities will be built one each at two villages, namely Allel Kyun Village and Kan Thar Village. We have selected two construction companies, submitted construction applications to the Ministry of Health, consulted with the Takton Township Health Department. Upon obtaining the construction approvals, actual construction works will take off. The above left photo shows the sub-center building completed in another district. The photo

below shows the Country Director visiting the construction site.

### FY2016 Business Plan

PHJ concluded the Memorandum of Understanding with the Myanmar Government in August 2014 and established the Myanmar Office in Nay Pyi Taw in March 2015. In FY2016, PHJ will engage in practical activities of strengthening health administration function for maternal and child health improvement consisting of the following four projects.



- 1. Strengthening emergency transportation system
- 2. Construction of medical and health clinics and supporting medical equipment
- 3. Strengthening midwife skills
- 4. Extending maternal and child health education

In strengthening the emergency transportation system, PHJ aims at enhancing the transportation system making use of the ambulance donated to the Takton Township Hospital in July this year.

As for the construction of the clinics explained above, PHJ will be constructing two sub-centers and selected the construction companies. As soon as the Ministry of Health approves our application, the construction works will start.

To strengthen the midwives' skills, PHJ conducts a survey among the midwives to find out the present issues and actual needs, and extend practical trainings on delivery inviting lecturers from outside.

In extending maternal and child health education, PHJ will train community health volunteers who will take initiatives in extending maternal and child health education toward pregnant women in respective communities.

As PHJ Myanmar Office will start a full scale maternal and child health improvement project this year, we request your continued support.

### East Japan Disaster Reconstruction Support (on Kesen-numa) By Masaru Yokoo, East Japan Project Manager

Immediately after the East Japan Disaster of March 11, 2011, PHJ started the emergency disaster support in Kesen-numa City, Miyagi Prefecture in cooperation with All Japan Hospital Association (AJHA). The AJHA recommended PHJ to contact the Kesen-numa Medical Association (KMA) and the first phase support consisted of the emergency dispatch of medical team. The phase two support started in July 2011 and consisted of the support of medical equipment and other needs of private hospitals that suffered from the disaster and tsunami, based on the investigation by the KMA.

With the donation money and donation of goods, PHJ distributed 45 million yen worth goods from the first and fourth phase support to the hospitals. Further, PHJ extended PCs, printers, clothings, posters, masks, medical equipment not only to the hospitals but also to elementary school and secondary schools as well as social welfare and medical care facilities.

In August 2015, Chairperson Oda, project managers Kitajima and Yokoo visited Kesen-numa City Mayor Mr. Sugawara and reported the PHJ's support to the city. The Mayor expressed his appreciation for the PHJ's continuing support. PHJ members also visited the cemetery of the late Dr. Otomo who supervised the medical care services of the Kesen-numa City since the disaster as the director of the KMA and who passed away in April this year. Dr. Otomo had given PHJ good advice so that the PHJ's support would truly be useful to the hospitals and community. We prayed for his peace in the heaven.

Today, most of the hospitals in the Kesen-numa City are able to extend medical services just as before the disaster. We also learned that some hospitals that gave up medical services immediately after the disaster are resuming the services recently. PHJ will continue to extend the disaster reconstruction support in cooperation with the KMA.

### PHJ Staff Introduction

### Mitsuki Sakurakoji



I joined PHJ in August as a Cambodia project staff of International Operations Department.
